






a. Turbulent times(2/5)

a. Turbulent times (4/5)


Geopolitical, environmental, economic, societal and technological **shocks** across sectors and countries

→ polycrisis: "a cluster of interconnected crises in which the overall impact exceeds the sum of each part" (C.Lachman, 2024) not only at local, but also at global scale

Polycrises are the consequences of policy errors and flaws in the design and implementation of governance systems








b. 'Re-concentration' of governance (1/7)



- Proliferation of international commitments by governments («Targets Olympics» like in Glasgow CoP 26) that makes difficult the process of «blaming and shaming» by civil society;
- New strong normative frameworks and new policy tools
 (e.g., EU Green Deal, New York Declaration on Forests, Kunming-Montreal
 Global Biodiversity Framework, EU Deforestation Regulation, US Forest Act, ...);
- Numerous voluntary initiatives led by civil society are now being supplanted by public regulatory initiatives.





 "The first step toward change is awareness" (N.Branden): understanding risk, presenting the outcomes of crisis ("costs of inaction"), giving evidence to problem-solving paths

- Convergence of governance coordination: focus on the most **basic**, **commonly shared values**: biodiversity protection, adaptation to CC, land restoration, green care → forests are a unique field for such policies
- Support deep multidisciplinary, reciprocally respectful actions inspired by the «Medici effect» (Johansson, 2004): the Renaissance in Italy came from painters, sculptors, poets, philosophers, financiers, and architects put together at work and supported by the Medici family action.
- Re-launch multilateralism: diffuse reciprocity in safeguarding the planet's forests.
